ENDLESS OPPORTUNITIES

Endless Opportunities is a community-based program hosting educational and social programming tailored for Jewish adults ages 60+. It is a partnership between TDHS, Jewish Family Service, Temple B'nai Torah, Congregation Beth Shalom, and Herzl-Ner Tamid. Annual events include the Chanukkah Party at TBT (on Dec 1, 2016) and a visit to the symphony. Bi-weekly lectures take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:30 AM-noon; light kosher brunch is provided.

Not only is Endless Opportunities a place for lifelong learning, it is a warm and welcoming space to socialize and connect with longtime friends while making new ones. Programming is open to all and no membership is required.



LEARNING IN YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD



RABBI DANIEL WEINER

"...DO WE NOT BLEED:" SHAKESPEARE, SHYLOCK AND THE ANATOMY OF A DRAMATIC PORTRAIT. Is the Bard's *The Merchant of Venice* a portrayal of a single Jew or a more pernicious generalization? Is there really a distinction?

LIBERAL ZIONISM: NUANCED IDENTITY OR OXYMORON? The recent Gaza conflict has taxed the cognitive dissonance of many American Jews who both love and support Israel while cherishing the progressive values from which Israel seems

increasingly distant. In an era of black and white oversimplification and stereotype, are we witnessing the emergence of a new and nuanced Liberal Zionist ethic?



RABBI JACLYN COHEN

KEEPING THE COVENANT: UNDERSTANDING JEWISH LIFE-CYCLE RITUALS. A Jewish life-cycle event, whether it be a bris, Bar Mitzvah, wedding, or funeral, roots us in our identity and places us within a greater community. In addition to exploring the nuts and bolts of the Jewish Life Cycle, this course will address how and why life cycles possess such power in our Jewish lives. We will ask: from where do our most beloved and best-known Jewish life-cycle rituals emerge? How do we understand the language and movements of these rituals? And how can we innovate what we

know as "tradition" to fit our modern and evolving Jewish practices today? Required texts: *Inventing Jewish Ritual*, by Carol Ochs.

MIDDOT AND MUSSAR. Middot are the Jewish values that guide our lives. Mussar is a spiritual practice that helps us learn to be the best versions of ourselves by finding a balance between extremes. This course will be a study of individual middot – such as humility (anavah) and compassion (rachamim) – and it will help us cultivate a spiritual mussar practice. We will study themes and cite examples within our sacred text and explore different methods of achieving balance in our hectic and fast-paced lives. Required text: Everyday Holiness: The Jewish Spiritual Path of Mussar, by Alan Morinis.



RABBI AARON MEYER

ASK A RABBI: THE RESPONSA LITERATURE. Should we take money from Messianic "Jews"? Is organ donation permissible in Jewish law? What should we do about Halloween? Learn more about responsa literature, the historical question and answer texts of Jewish tradition through case study and examples.

DO JEWS HAVE A CREED AND A CATECHISM? While the saying is true - 2 Jews, 415 opinions - throughout Jewish history many have attempted to summarize and

simplify Jewish beliefs. In the form of creeds, formal statements of religious belief, and catechisms, summaries of the principles of religion in the form of questions and answers, we have tried to pass on the essence of Judaism to future generations. Get hands on with these historic texts and attempt to summarize a creed for the 21st century.
