Let It Not Happen Again: Lessons of the Japanese American Exclusion



More than 120,000 Japanese American men, women, and children were forcibly removed and incarcerated during World War II. Clarence Moriwaki will share the story of Bainbridge Island—the origin point of the Japanese American exclusion—to provide a human, historical account of this national tragedy, and to ask the question: Are there parallels to what's happening in America now? Using historical images, including historical and current propaganda, we will explore the fear, racism, and failure of political leadership that led to these unconstitutional actions during World War II, and why we must not let it happen again.
